*Welcome to the January 2006 edition of the YKIP newsletter. In this issue, we bring you news about the October 1st bombings and update you on our projects.*

## On October 1, 2005, three bombs hit Jimbaran and Kuta Once again, tragedy struck the island of Bali.

On a balmy Saturday night, three bombs went off simultaneously at Raja's Café in Kuta Square and Café Nyoman and Café Menega at Jimbaran beach. Twenty-three people died and 76 were injured; many of the victims were Indonesians although Australian, Japanese, Korean, German, French, and American tourists were also killed or hurt. The three suicide bombers have been identified and one of their ringleaders was shot and killed by Indonesian police in November 2005 in East Java. These bombings re-opened wounds for the victims of the 2002 bomb blasts who were just beginning to get their lives back to a sense of normalcy.

As soon as the bomb went off, volunteers from Bali Cares, IDEP and the Indonesian Red Cross, among others, were down at the hospital assisting in whatever way they could. A Crisis Centre was up and running within a few hours, helping families locate their loved ones and providing blankets and food for the families of the victims. This time, the hospital and volunteers were much more prepared and things went much more smoothly. YKIP/ALF aided the Crisis Centre by sending down over 1,000 meals for the volunteers and victim's families as well as providing milk and protein drinks for blood donors and much needed computer supplies ([www.BaliBombOct2005-sanglah.org](http://www.BaliBombOct2005-sanglah.org)).

The ALF (Annika Linden Foundation) and Mark Weingard immediately sent funds to help the victims (thank you, ALF!) by setting up a Victims Support Fund managed by YKIP. Part of these funds went to the Kanaivasu Foundation for trauma counseling. Many of their psychiatrists, counselors and staff worked with YKIP in 2002 in the Wayang Kulit Trauma Counseling Project and

have continued on their own to work with the 2002 bomb victims ([see www.kanaivasu.org](http://www.kanaivasu.org)). They set up a POSKO Information and Counseling Centre behind the bombed out cafes in Jimbaran and have seen over 50 clients at this centre as well as their main office in Renon.

At the *pelaspasan* cleansing ceremony at Jimbaran on November 5th, 2005, the Red Cross sponsored a performance of the Salju Group, one of the top comedy acts on the island. The show brought laughter to a somber occasion and had messages about the need for counseling imbedded within the jokes. The comedians, all men (three cross-dressed as women) talked about being stressed out and how one could be helped by getting counseling (talking about one's problems, whether to friends or a professional is not practiced in Bali). Brochures (paid for by YKIP/ALF) were passed out about Kanaivasu's services.





It seemed like the entire village of Jimbaran was there, dressed in their temple finery. It was two hours of non-stop laughter.

The success of our Wayang Kulit Trauma Counseling Project in 2002 prompted us to ask I Made Sidia, the puppeteer, to update the show and perform it at the cleansing ceremonies in Kuta (October 30, 2005) and Jimbaran (November 4, 2005). YKIP worked with Kanaivasu and Red Cross volunteers in the distribution of the Kanaivasu brochures at both venues and to ensure that the messages in the Wayang were appropriate to the situation.

## VICTIM SUPPORT

YKIP/ALF also reimbursed IDEP/Bali Cares for some of the costs incurred in setting up the Crisis Centre. For the long term, YKIP has committed to helping with the educational needs of the children of the Indonesian victims who reside on Bali, with the caveat that this assistance goes to those families who are poor. There are 12 eligible children; eight of them are still of pre-school age and will be given educational savings bonds that they can cash in when their children begin school. Three of these preschoolers, whose parents are quite poor, will be supported through the end of Primary School and beyond if possible.

I Wayan Sudika, who perished in the bomb, left behind a one year daughter who will be supported through Senior High School, and if funds permit, through university. The Remaining three children of injured victims, who are in primary school, will have their education paid for through June 2007 and then be re-evaluated. It is the policy of YKIDS to fund the injured victims' children's schooling for a short period of time until the parents return to work.

### Working with the Annika Linden Foundation

The Annika Linden Foundation (ALF) was founded in 2003 to honor the memory of Annika Linden, a young woman who perished in the Kuta bomb blast. Her fiancé at the time, Mark Weingard has established the Annika Linden Foundation ([www.alfoundation.org](http://www.alfoundation.org)) with Moo Baulch and are working to help rebuild Bali by donating funds to sustainable projects in the fields of education and children's issues. In 2003, YKIP received a very generous donation of \$ 100,000 from ALF (for the Children's Education Trust and MREC), in 2004 an additional \$ 100,000, in 2005 YKIP received a total of \$260,000 (this includes \$ 100,000 for an Emergency Reserve and Victim Support Fund) and for 2006 an additional \$ 189,000 to continue with our existing projects. We are very grateful for the continuing support of the Annika Linden Foundation.

# NEW PROJECT: PANTI JOMPO WANA SERAYA (AGED CARE HOME)



The Werdha Seraya Aged Care Home in Ketewel is a government home that has the capacity to house about 60 elders. This program might seem incongruous in a culture that takes care of their elders at home, but it actually is something that is needed now. Many of the elders brought to this home were brought not by family members, but by police who found the elders wandering the streets. Some elders have been abandoned by their families or kicked out of the house for various reasons. But they now have a very clean and healthy environment to live in, with good meals and an on-site clinic. There are forty-nine residents at this Elder Home, most of them female.

Nils Wetterlind of Tropical Homes visited this home and wanted to do something to help the elders. He started by bringing in fresh food for lunch to ensure that they were getting enough protein, vegetables and fruit. Basic medicines were purchased and put in the sick ward. The home is split into two areas: most of the residents live together on the Western side of the home, where they can socialize with their friends and make offerings and brooms together (which they sell).

The clinic, which currently houses fifteen residents, is on the eastern side. Until November 2005, the clinic's buildings were very run-down. Thanks to

Tropical Living, the clinic now sports four brand new buildings. The pelaspasan blessing ceremony was held on November 6, 2005 with all residents in attendance. Short speeches by I Nyoman Wiyoga, the director of the home, Gede Ardana, Msi, Head of Social Rehabilitation of the Social Welfare Department and Nils himself were made before the official ribbon cutting ceremony. This was followed by a performance by the comedy troupe SALJU TROUPE who had their very own "Dadong" or grandmother who (in the story acted out) was going to come and stay at the Elder Home. The residents were very much entertained by this story.

YKIP wants the residents to participate in more interactive programs. As the home already had half a gamelan orchestra, YKIP decided to bring in a teacher and the elders (including six women!) are now banging away and making music twice a week. We hope to get some programs with local youth groups organized in the near future.

YKIP is administering the funds from Tropical Homes and has hired Hartanto, a part-time field officer to run this project. ■

## REPORTS ON ONGOING PROJECTS:

# YKIP/KIDS (Kuta International Disaster Scholarship) CHILDREN'S EDUCATIONAL TRUST FUND

In a long term, collaborative effort, this project provides educational funding and support for the many children of victims, who were killed or injured in the Bali bomb. YKIP joined forces with KIDS (Kuta International Disaster Scholarship, set up by volunteers from COURTS, an international chain of furniture and electronics shops) to create the YKIP/KIDS Educational Trust Fund. Given the very young age of some of the children concerned, this project will have a life span of at least 20 years, another sign of the long road ahead for YKIP. We give support either by direct payments to the schools concerned or through Educational Savings Certificates (Tabungan Pendidikan) with Bank Niaga. All school fees, extra lessons, extracurricular activities, school uniforms, shoes, books and stationary are paid for by this fund. When this project began, we were supporting 30 children (50 children who had lost a parent and 80 who had parents who were injured). The parents of 7 of the latter group have returned to work (most of them worked at Paddy's Club and have returned to work at the new facility). YKIP/KIDS is no longer responsible for these 7 children's education, which was already agreed upon between YKIP/KIDS and the parents from the beginning. Therefore, for this current school year (July 2005 -June 2006), YKIP/KIDS is supporting the

48 children in the original group plus an additional 10 children whose parents are permanently injured and cannot work. We currently have enough funds to ensure that each child can graduate from high school and those children that are in junior and senior high can go on to Indonesian universities; we would like to see that fund increased so that university education is available to all children. Two children have now graduated from university and one has gotten married.

In July, we had our semi-annual KIDS GATHERING at Taman Tirta swimming pool where all of the families gathered, swam and ate lunch together. This was organized by YKIP Field Officer Putu Sherlyana and the volunteer crew from COURTS. On December 31st, we will have our end of the year gathering in Denpasar. Victims from the 2005 bomb who have children will also be invited to join at this time. The 2002 bomb victims were concerned that funds for their children's education may now be switched to the 2005 bomb victims. A meeting was held with representatives from Isana Dewata, the victims' foundation, COURTS and YKIP/KIDS to reassure them that the funds allocated for their children is only to be used for that purpose. ## MREC (Medical Resource Education Centre) Medical Library

MREC (Medical Resource Education Centre) Medical Library This project's purpose is to provide and to equip a medical reference and education center (MREC) housed at Udayana University Medical Faculty. YKIP is working closely with a number of doctors from the university medical faculty and hospitals in Bali to implement a program to improve training for Balinese doctors, medical students and paramedics, both here and overseas. MREC provides students and medical personnel with better access to information in Medical Science since the MREC is equipped with comprehensive facilities such as online Medical references, the latest edition of books, and ten computers with internet access. Special English programs and a fully equipped language lab are on the same premises as the library to assist students and medical staff in upgrading their English skills. Three bi-lingual medical student librarians are working to assist with procuring necessary information to complete assignments and research. YKIP together

with ALF have funded the computers and books while the student librarians salaries are being paid for by ALF. Dr Carlo Fornizetti, Head of YKIP's Medical Committee is holding weekly meetings with the YKIP junior officers to monitor their activities and has instigated critical article reading . A medical subject of the month which, via chosen articles affixed on the MREC billboard, is meant to create discussions with the users of MREC and guide them in critical research and reading . The junior officers have produced a data base with contact names and addresses of national pharmaceutical industries and medical publishers to be contacted to make them aware of MREC activities and to ask for donations and sponsorships. In May, these student librarians went to observe various Projects at the East Bali Poverty Project with a view to working together in the future. # THE CHILDREN'S HEARING PROJECT

There are hundreds (we are not sure of the exact number) of hearing impaired and deaf children in Bali. This project focuses on giving hearing aids (plus annual maintenance) to a number of children who attend schools for the deaf on Bali. In this project, we also procure donated used, and new hearing aids as well as batteries, and ensure that the children are continually re-tested and re-fitted for appropriate hearing aids. Working with Ni Kadek Yuliarti and Vikki McKay, a Canadian consultant at LUMINA Hearing Clinic in Denpasar, we have been able to test all of the eligible children at the State School for the Deaf in Jimbaran. This school has 160 students, 40 of whom could benefit from hearing aids. We are pleased to announce that the The Annika Linden Foundation has made it possible for all 40 students to attain hearing aids. Twenty-eight new students have been tested who would benefit from hearing aids and 18 of them are already wearing their new aids. It only costs \$ 150/year per child for maintenance of these donated used hearing aids. Last August, Vikki and YKIP fieldworker Astrid visited four other special needs schools on the island, trying to ascertain how many deaf and hearing impaired children are on Bali. It turns out that these special schools (in Bangli, Tabanan, Klungkung and Gianyar) are very poorly equipped and have little else than a board

and chalk with which to teach. Most of the schools have rooms with mattresses on the floors that are used as dormitories. YKIP would like to get all of these children's hearing tested and then look for donors to pay for their hearing aids and maintenance. Funds are also needed to assist with repairing the schools and providing them with needed supplies. LUMINA/SIEMENS is now making its own audiometers locally in Bali for under \$300. These machines are portable and are easy to use. We are hoping to be able to train teachers in these school to use them. In October, Adrienne Oberoi, an American adult hearing child of deaf parents met with some of the parents at SLBB to talk about her childhood and how she coped with living with deaf parents. There is so much stigma attached to people with special needs in Indonesia and very little support from schools or the community. We want to try and help these families communicate better with their children, and Adrienne (who speaks fluent Indonesian and American sign language, which shares many similarities with Indonesian sign language) is going to start regular sign language classes for parents and teachers in January 2006. More importantly, she will be sharing her experiences with the parents so that they can better understand the needs of their children. We are very grateful for the time and effort Adrienne is putting into this school.

We have surveyed all of the Special Needs schools in Bali so we can assess how many children there are who could benefit from hearing aids. We will then try and find donors for these children. There are plans to create some simple readers in Indonesian with pictures, words and the appropriate sign/s for these children, who have no access to this type of book. Funding the projects we currently support and assisting them in becoming more sustainable is our goal. ■

# KEMBALI SCHOLARSHIP FUND



This scholarship program for primary and junior high school students began in the Gianyar regency of Bali. Working together with Gianyar Sejahtera (GS) foundation (a subsidiary of the regional Department of Social Welfare), we have been able to pinpoint those students in most dire need of funds. All school fees, uniforms and supplies are paid for and a small stipend is given for lunch money. All supplies are purchased by YKIP and GS and given directly to the student along with their lunch money. The YKIP fieldworker, Ni Kadek Astrid Ariana Rejonta visits each student and family to ensure that one, they fall within the eligibility parameters and two, that they are indeed receiving the funding pledged. The first KEMBALI school year ended in June 2005 and we are pleased to say that all of the students passed on to the next grade. Our survey of the families (the YKIP

fieldworker went to every student's home to ascertain their needs. For the first semester of the academic year of 2005-2006, we supported 201 primary school children and 24 junior high students. That has gone up to 392 primary school children and 24 junior high students for the second semester, beginning in January 2006. For purposes of streamlining our accounting, donations received between mid-July and December will be used for scholarships beginning in January (the second semester) and likewise those received between January and mid-July will be used for the following first semester. Our goal is to be able to put 1169 poor students in Gianyar through nine years of school.

In December, Heidi Hornberger, a sculptor from California and three of her friends ran a wonderful project for the 23 children they and other donors are sponsoring. Disposable cameras were given to each child and they were instructed to take photographs of their daily lives. A week later all the children gathered together and made scrapbooks from their photographs for their sponsors. Some of the photographs were simply brilliant (and a few of half-naked grandmothers too racy for publication!). Keep an eye out on our website for "A Day in the Life of a Student"

## KEMBALI NORTH SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

There are five primary schools in the Pemuteran, North Bali area, all of which are in dire need of repair, benches and tables for the children and books. Many of the 831 children here live in poverty. The ALF has generously paid for the building of 200 tables and benches, exercise writing books and schoolbooks for

all 831 children. We are hoping to expand the KEMBALI scholarship program into this area if we can get all of the impoverished elementary school students (approximately 300) sponsored in order to alleviate any jealousies among them. The children with their new school textbooks. ■

## YRS (Yayasan Rama Serana) REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH CLINIC

From January-June of 2005, this clinic has served 4,455 women. The brainchild of dr. Luh Putu Upadisari (see above), this small but viable clinic on the fourth floor of the largest traditional market on Bali is an idea whose time has come. Women can obtain pap smears, lab tests, general check ups and medications on a sliding scale basis. Dr. Sari believes in empowering women and their partners

with information and seminars and workshops are frequently held to describe the symptoms of STDs and what can be done about it. Preventative health care is a large component of Dr. Sari's vision to help the 8,000 women who come through this market on a daily basis. ## YAKKUM

YKIP/ALF first assisted YAKKUM by funding an orthopedic and prosthesis workshop. In June, ALF gave YAKKUM additional funds to renovate a large building in Karangasem to be used as a center for physically challenged to come together and work on handicraft projects. ALF also gave them the funds to purchase a digital camera, computer and printer and best of all an angklung gamelan orchestra. We expect to hear them playing in temple festivals in the near future. Three of YAKKUM's clients are taking a three-month wood-carving course (under the sponsorship of BRF/ACCESS) so that they will be able to support themselves. ■

## YAKEBA (YAYASAN KESEHATAN BALI) DRUG, ALCOHOL AND HIV/AIDS AWARENESS IN THE SCHOOLS

This innovative and interactive program in Bali's high schools brings doctors, former addicts and counselors together with students to discuss the dangers of drugs and HIV/AIDS. Over 72 schools have been visited and 6,800 students reached in 2005. In 2006, we plan to work with AWARE, an HIV/AIDS awareness program for high school students begun by university students at BARD College in the US. ## NORTH BALI WOMEN'S HEALTH CARE

North Bali is one of the most impoverished parts of the island of Bali. This project has trained and equipped two midwives to help detect breast and cervical cancer and many forms of STDs (Sexually Transmitted Diseases). Free exams and pap smears are given to the local women as well as free educational programs to inform these women and their partners

about reproductive health. Since the clinics opened in August 2004, 67 women have had pap smears and been treated. It has turned out that the women are reluctant to go to the clinics. Since August of this year, no women have come to the clinic and YKIP has decided to close this project. The Annika Linden Foundation gave The East Bali Poverty Project US\$40,000 in 2004 and \$39,000 In 2005 to run their various educational and health projects. The EBPP was set up by David Booth to assist the poorest (and most inaccessible) villages in Bali. YKIP is administering specific projects for the ALF. In 2004, six projects were funded and in 2005 four projects: uniforms for school children; launch of educational art story book; integrated education program in Manikaja and contribution toward purchase and running costs of a Daihatsu Hilina long wheel-base 4WD. ## FUNDRAISING WORKSHOP

In September, YKIP in conjunction with PIRAC (Public Interest Research and Advocacy Centre) held a four-day fundraising workshop for 18 different NGOs on Bali. This basic fundraising workshop was held in order to assist these foundations with fundraising techniques, focusing on domestic donors (as opposed to international). The trainers from PIRAC (who co-sponsored this workshop with the Bali Rehabilitation Fund/ACCESS of AusAid) worked the NGO leaders hard with hands-on exercises. Follow-up will be done by YKIP at 3 and 6 months intervals after the workshop to ascertain how the NGOs implemented what they learned. Thank you to BRF and PIRAC for their assistance! ■

## TRAINING COURSES



WOODCARVERS of YAKKUM sponsored by BRF

The Bali Rehabilitation Fund/ACCESS of AusAid funded a number of re-training courses for YKIP's clients. These included computer courses for all of the staff at the SLBB Deaf School and two staff from GNOTA (Foster Parents Movement)/KEMBALI; sewing course for nine widows, a beauty salon course for one widow and a cake-making course for four widows from the 2002 Bali bombings. These short courses, which began in September 2005 have very much helped upgrade the skills of these staff and widows. YKIP would like to thank BRF for their participation in the funding of these courses. ■
